### Tom Hockensmith, Chair, Polk County Board of Supervisors

On behalf of the Polk County Board of Supervisors, it is my pleasure to present our FY 2012/13 Annual Report. Polk County had another eventful year and I am pleased to provide a few highlights.



The Polk County Board of Supervisors recognizes the importance of an in-jail drug program and is pleased to partner with the Bridges of Iowa to provide in-house substance abuse treatment at the Polk County Jail. The program will serve a total of 120 inmates with the expectation of making a difference in the lives of those who are incarcerated as a result of substance abuse.

The continued success of the Iowa Events Center is credited, primarily, to the management firm of Global Spectrum. Global Spectrum has done a tremendous job of securing events that are popular with the residents of Polk County from the NCAA Division Wrestling Championships to AHL Hockey to a sold-out concert series.

The Board held a retreat that involved developing a strategic plan for Polk County, focusing on the future as we implement an integrated structure to its decision-making process with the purpose of linking its strategic plan to the annual budgeting process through a funding strategy that apportions resources to County services.

The Neighborhood Finance Corporation & Housing Trust Fund was another entity with which the Board entered another agreement that will provide funding through 2014 for neighborhood housing revitalization programs to low- and moderate-income areas in Des Moines. In addition, is an agreement with Iowa Legal Aid to

There are four large undertakings to which the Board is especially excited:

The renovation of the historic Courthouse, which will include remodeling of the Wellmark Building into a Justice Center for the County Attorney, Magistrate, Juvenile, Small Claims, Traffic Court and Clerk of Court records and the renovation of the old main jail into a Criminal Court Annex. This phased approach is subject to approval of the plan by the voters of Polk County and would occur over the course of several years.

The construction of a Senior/Community Center for those who reside in western Polk County. Valley Junction will be home to the new center, containing many wonderful amenities.

An agreement between Polk County, the YMCA of Greater Des Moines and Wellmark was initiated and the result was a land swap—the former Polk County Convention Complex (known as the Plex) for the Wellmark building. This transaction will provide relief for the Courts as a new Justice Center, as well as relocating the Polk County Attorney office out of leased space.

A referendum was held November 2012, that was approved by the voters of Polk County, to spend an allotted amount of money for the purpose of acquiring and developing land for public parks or other recreation or conservation purposed to be managed by the Polk County Conservation Board. This referendum includes protecting the water quality of rivers, lakes and streams and protecting drinking water sources, wildlife habitat and natural areas along with prevention of flooding. In addition, there will be construction and improvement of trails and conservation facilities, all within Polk County. The Board looks forward to working closely with the Polk County Conservation Board to review and approve these projects.

The Board of Supervisors is pleased to share this FY 2012/13 Annual Report and we continue to commit to effectively represent the interests of Polk County citizens and provide leadership in the greater community of Polk County.

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### ROBERT BROWNELL DISTRICT 1

Robert Brownell was elected in 2000 and is serving his fourth term. After redistricting took place in January 2013, Polk County 1st District is now made up of Alleman, Clive, Elkhart, Grimes, Johnston, Polk City, Sheldahl and Urbandale. Brownell's experience in government began when he was elected in 1985 to Clive's City Council. He was elected as mayor in 1993 where he served until his election to the Polk County Board of Supervisors.



Brownell was raised in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He attended Missouri Military Academy in Mexico, Missouri and graduated from Kennedy High School in Cedar Rapids. He obtained his undergraduate degree from the University of Northern Iowa cum laude in English and Education. He has attended Drake University for post graduate work. Brownell served as Branch Manager for Yellow Transportation in Des Moines for 15 years. Prior to Yellow, he held several management positions with Roadway Express across the Midwest.

Brownell has been married 32 years, has a son and daughter-in-law and a granddaughter.

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### ANGELA CONNOLLY DISTRICT 2

Angela Connolly was first elected as a Polk County Supervisor in 1998. She has served as Chairperson of the Board in 2000, 2003, 2006, 2009 and 2012. Prior to joining the Board of Supervisors, Connolly spent 19 years working at the Polk County Planning and Zoning department and was an active member of AFSCME Local 1868.



She has been active in many civic and community activities, including the Metropolitan Advisory Council and neighborhood organizations. Connolly currently serves as the Chair of The Tomorrow Plan. She also is currently serving as a Tri-Chair for Capital Crossroads: A Vision for Greater Des Moines and Central Iowa

In addition, she serves on the board of the Des Moines Area Metropolitan Planning Organization, Rebuilding Together, Des Moines Area Regional Transit Authority – DART, Greater Des Moines Convention and Visitors Bureau, Polk County Health Services, Greater Des Moines Partnership, NAMI Walks Advisory Council, Riverfront Development Authority, Polk County Housing Trust Fund, Transit 2030, Homeless Coordinating Council, Criminal Justice Coordinating Council and has served as past President of the Iowa State Association of Counties (ISAC).

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### STEVE VAN OORT DISTRICT 3

Steve Van Oort began serving his first term as Polk County Supervisor in January 2013. He represents Polk County's 3rd District, which includes the cities of Altoona, Ankeny, Bondurant, Mitchellville, Pleasant Hill, and the unincorporated portion of Polk County.



Steve Van Oort, served seven years as Mayor of Ankeny starting in 2006 after serving one term on the Ankeny City Council as Mayor Pro Tem. In his role as Polk County Supervisor, he serves on the boards of Aging Resources of Central Iowa, Mid Iowa Association of Local Governments, Mid-Iowa Development Fund, Neighborhood Finance Corporation, Polk County Housing Trust Fund, Metro Advisory Council and Eastern Polk Regional Economic Development Corporation. He also serves as Commissioner and Chair of the Des Moines Area Regional Transit Authority.

Steve was named Ankeny Citizen of the Year in 2000, Ankeny Rotarian of the Year in 2004 and Ankeny Person of Vision in 2010. He is a member and past President of Rotary Club of Ankeny and member of the Board of Directors of the Partnership for a Drug Free Iowa.

Steve and his wife, Darlene, have two daughters, Amee and Stephanie and one grandson, William. Steve attended Ankeny High School and John Brown University.

### TOM HOCKENSMITH DISTRICT 4

Tom Hockensmith began serving his first term as Polk County Supervisor in January 2003. At that time, he represented Polk County's 3rd District, which included the cities of Alleman, Altoona, Bondurant, Elkhart, Mitchellville, Pleasant Hill, Polk City, Runnells and the northeast section of Des Moines. Since redistricting of 2013, he now represents East Des Moines, Runnells, Camp Township, Fourmile Township, as well as a portion of Saylor Township and the Northeast and Southeast portions of the City of Des Moines. He served as Chair of the Board in 2005, 2007, 2010 and 2013.

Hockensmith's previous professional experience includes positions as a policy advisor for Iowa Governor Thomas J. Vilsack, a union representative for American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) and as an electrician for the Iowa Department of Transportation.

Hockensmith and his wife have two daughters, in addition to Hockensmith's two sons and four grandchildren.

### JOHN F. MAURO DISTRICT 5

John F. Mauro is serving his fourth term as a member of the Board of Supervisors from Polk County's Fifth District. Mauro previously served the citizens of Polk County for two consecutive terms after being elected in 1990. He has served as Chair of the Board of Supervisors in 1993, 1996, 2004, 2008 and 2011.



John is a native of Des Moines and was born and raised on Des Moines' south side. He has been a self-employed businessman and has owned his own insurance agency for many years.

John and his wife, Grace, have been married for 49 years. They have 3 sons and 7 grandchildren.

### **Elected Officials**

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### BILL MCCARTHY SHERIFF

Bill McCarthy was elected Sheriff in November 2008. Prior to becoming Sheriff, McCarthy served for two years as Chief Deputy. Sheriff McCarthy's law enforcement career began over 40 years ago as a Police Officer with the Des Moines Police Department. He held positions as an Investigator, Sergeant, Lieutenant, Captain, Assistant Chief and served as the Des Moines Police Chief until his retirement in February 2006.



McCarthy earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice and a Master of Public

Administration Degree from Drake University. He is a graduate of the Police Executive Research Forum's and Harvard's Senior Management Institutes for Police and the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Program and is a certified Polygraph Examiner.

Sheriff McCarthy served five years as president of South Des Moines Little League. He has also administered the Police Athletic League, which over a number of years has provided a variety of youth sporting activities for hundreds of low-income children in the Des Moines inner city and was instrumental in reopening the Westside Boxing Club and establishing the Eastside Boxing Club.

Among his many civic involvements--one that stands out in particular--was his participation in the Presidential White House Policy Council meetings on youth gangs and violence, helping to shape the President's initiative on federal juvenile legislation. Sheriff McCarthy continues to be active in many civic and community organizations.

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### JAMIE FITZGERALD AUDITOR

Jamie Fitzgerald is currently serving his second full term as Polk County Auditor and Commissioner of Elections.

As Auditor, Jamie has implemented efficiency and conservation measures which have cut printing in the administrative department more than 25 percent. This was accomplished by scanning tens of thousands of historical documents, saving ad-

ditional storage and staff resources.



He has championed a transparent, open-government office inviting candidates, the media and the public to his office for election demonstrations, tours and explanations of the voting process. His office is regularly the first office in Iowa to report election-night results.

Fitzgerald also changed how board agendas, minutes and audio are distributed by making the entire board packet available on his website for the public to view. He produces a bi-weekly newsletter for citizens, staff and the media.

Jamie received his Bachelor of Arts from Iowa State University in 1994 and an Associate of Arts degree from Iowa Central Community College in 1992. He also added a Certified Public Manager Certificate from Drake University in 2010.

### JULIE HAGGERTY RECORDER

Julie Haggerty was sworn into office in January 2007. She is a life-long resident of Polk County, attended Dowling High School and Arizona State University. She is a 2008 graduate of the Greater Des Moines Leadership Institute.

Since taking office, Haggerty has extended her office hours and established a same-day recording policy. As an elected official, she has been given the opportunity to serve residents of Polk County in many ways. When Homeland Security established new laws requiring passports for travel to Mexico and Canada, she brought services to the citizens of Polk Coun-



ty by launching Passport Saturdays in libraries, senior centers and even opened her downtown office on several Saturdays for passport applications and boat registration renewals. She has met with members of the Citizen's Academy and other civic groups to explain the duties of her office and share the many ways that Polk County serves its citizens. Julie served as a member of the Miracle League steering committee that helped build a baseball field near Principal Park for kids with disabilities.

Most recently, she has served as a member of the Capital Improvements Program Board for the City of Urbandale, and is currently part of the Information Technology Steering Committee at Polk County and a board member of the Urbandale Food Pantry. Haggerty has also served as President of District 1 of the Iowa Recorder's Association.

In 2012, the Recorder's Office was awarded another Historical Resource Development grant from the State of Iowa. The funds from this grant helped to digitize, maintain and preserve vital records dating back to the early 1900's. The digitization of these records will give the general public easier access for the retrieval and reproduction of these archived documents.

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### JOHN SARCONE ATTORNEY

John Sarcone graduated cum laude from Rockhurst College in 1972 with an A.B. degree in History and was a member of Alpha Sigma Nu, the Jesuit honor society. In 1975, he graduated from Drake University Law School and was admitted to the Iowa Bar in June of that same year.



Sarcone assumed the responsibilities of County Attorney in January 1991 and was re-elected in 1994, 1998, 2002, 2006 and 2010. He was Presient of the Iowa County Attorneys Association in 1998 and is currently a member of the Board of the Iowa County Attorneys Association. Sarcone was the Iowa State Director of the National District Attorneys Association from 1998 to 2000, as well as previously serving as Vice President of the NDAA Board of Directors and is the co-chair of the NDAA Legislative Committee.

### MARY MALONEY TREASURER

Mary Maloney has served as Polk County Treasurer since 1989, recently re-elected to her fifth term.





Significant technological changes have been made to the office in the last eighteen years; the Treasurer received an "Innovations in Government Award" in 1997 for many of these improvements. Maloney kicked off an eGovernment initiative in 2002 during her presidency of ISCTA, which received two national awards.

### BUDGET & STRATEGIC PLANNING DEB ANDERSON, POLK COUNTY BUDGET ANALYST

The financial condition of Polk County government remains strong. Cost savings measures and continued revenue from Prairie Meadows have allowed the County to continue to reinforce its fiscal condition. This situation has enabled the County to maintain the tax levy rate while still undertaking new projects and serving a key role in area development efforts.



Polk County maintains a AAA bond rating from three major rating agencies including Moody's Investors Service, Standard & Poor's Ratings Service, and Fitch Ratings. The ratings are the highest ratings available, and distinguish Polk County as having an extremely strong capacity to meet its financial commitments. Reports from these investor services cite the County's strong fund balances, conservative budgeting practices, lowdebt burden, and steady economic growth as the basis for the ratings.

Despite uncertain economic times, it is estimated the County will continue to maintain healthy fund balances throughout the upcoming fiscal year. Estimated General Fund ending balances are projected at 25 percent of expenditures, a percentage that falls within the County's adopted financial policies. Nonetheless, the County is closely monitoring the financial situation and reviewing the effect of the economy and state tax regulations on budget projections. We are committed to responsible fiscal management and will adapt as needed to continue serving the community in a cost-effective manner.

### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT GRANT AWARDS

### Initiatives

**Cooperative Hazardous Materials Agreement** The Board of Supervisors approved the continuation of the agreement between Polk County and the City of Des Moines to participate in hazardous materials clean up as it occurs throughout Polk County. This is an important regional service that is available when incidents involving hazardous substances occur within our community.

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**Courts Space Issue** OPN Architects and the National Center for State Courts completed the Courts Master Plan that provides a phased approach to handling the courts space issue. This approach includes renovation of the historic Courthouse, remodeling of the Wellmark Building into a Justice Center for the County Attorney, Magistrate, Juvenile, Small Claims, Traffic Court and Clerk of Court records and the renovation of the old main jail into a Criminal Court Annex. This phased approach would occur over the course of several years and is subject to approval of the plan by the voters.

### **Affordable Housing & Homelessness**

Polk County entered into new agreements with the Neighborhood Finance Corporation & Housing Trust Fund. These agreements provide funding through 2014 for the neighborhood housing revitalization programs which aids designated neighborhoods and low- and moderate-income areas in Des Moines. Polk County also entered into an agreement with

**In-Jail Drug Treatment Program** Polk County and Bridges of Iowa entered into a lease agreement for Bridges to provide in-house substance abuse treatment at the Polk County Jail. This program will serve a total of 120 inmates. The previous in-jail drug treatment program was discontinued due to lack of federal funding. The Board of Supervisors recognized the importance of this program and was happy to be able to partner with Bridges to bring this much needed service back to the community and make a difference in the lives of those who find themselves in a difficult situation due to incarceration as a result of substance abuse.

Iowa Legal Aid to allow them to continue to provide services to low-income residents in need within our community.

#### **Iowa Events Center**

The success of the Iowa Events Center continues through the oversight of our management firm Global Spectrum. In March, the Iowa Events Center was host to the NCAA Division Wrestling Championships. This event brought 90,000 athletes and fans to our community. In April, we saw the re-emergence of AHL hockey at Wells Fargo Arena. The NHL affiliate Minnesota Wild is owner of the new AHL Iowa Wild who will drop the puck on their inaugural season in October, 2013.

#### **Land Swap**

In November, an agreement between Polk County, the YMCA of Greater Des Moines and Wellmark was initiated. This transaction swaps the former Polk County Convention Complex (Plex) for the Wellmark building. The YMCA will relocate their facility to the Plex location. Polk County will utilize the Wellmark building to relocate the Polk County Attorney out of leased space and provide relief for the Courts as a new Justice Center. Polk County provided Wellmark \$500,000 to complete the transaction and committed to contribute \$1 million dollars to the YMCA for the demolition of their old facility along the riverwalk which will become a site for future commercial use.

### **Addressing the Needs of our Seniors**

The Board of Supervisors recognized a need and has approved the construction of a new 10,100 square foot senior/community center for residents of western Polk County. The new center will be located at 134 – 6th Street in Valley Junction. The Community Center will include a multi-function dining room with a capacity of 216, a fully operational kitchen, a card/computer room and lounge, billiards, craft and kiln room, a fitness room and classroom, a medical room with waiting area, office space, handicapped restrooms, on-site parking and an outdoor patio. The center will provide congregate meals and services to seniors and serve as a community gathering place for our seniors and west side residents for years to come.

#### **Strategic Planning**

The Board of Supervisors spent some time developing a strategic plan for Polk County. The retreat provided an opportunity for the Board to focus on the future of Polk County government as an organization and provide a cohesive structure to its decision making process. Polk County will link its strategic plan to the annual budgeting process through a funding strategy that allocates resources to County services.

#### Water and Land Legacy Bond

A referendum was held in November and overwhelmingly approved by the voters to spend an amount not to exceed \$50 million dollars for the purpose of acquisition and development of land for public parks or other recreation or conservation purposes to be managed by the Polk County Conservation Board including protecting the water quality of rivers, lakes and streams including the Des Moines and Raccoon Rivers and their tributaries, protect drinking water sources, wildlife habitat and natural areas, prevention of flooding and construction and improvement of trails and conservation facilities in Polk County. The Board of Supervisors in collaboration with the Polk County Conservation Board will work together to review and approve these projects through the budget process annually.



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The County Attorney is responsible for the prosecution of criminal offenses occurring in Polk County. The County Attorney also provides legal counsel to the Board of Supervisors and any of its departments or boards in civil matters.

The County Attorney handles all juvenile matters including delinquencies, child in need of assistance and termination of parental rights. Child welfare mediations are also handled in this office. 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On deaths that fall within the Polk County Medical Examiner jurisdiction, a Medicolegal Death Investigator will respond to the scene of the death. In the rare event that the legal next of kin have not been contacted by one of our Medicolegal Death Investigators, the legal next of kin will need to contact our office as soon as possible and inform us of the funeral home that the family wishes to use.



Chapter 331 of the Code of Iowa, Part 8 clearly defines which cases fall under the Medical Examiner

jurisdiction of medical examiners. Medical examiner cases include sudden, unexpected, violent or unnatural deaths, and other deaths "affecting the public interest." The definition of which deaths must be INVESTIGATED by medical examiners actually restricts those deaths which may be certified by physicians who are not medical examiners. Any death in which the manner of death is NOT natural, or any death in which the decedent was NOT seen by a physician within the previous 36 hours (lengthened to 30 days when the decedent had a diagnosed terminal or bedfast condition) MUST be INVESTIGATED by a medical examiner.

The office is also resonsible for investigating all requests for cremation.
