Message from the Chair

uly of 2008 began as we continued in our efforts to provide assistance to our citizens affected by the June floods. The Polk County Board of Supervisors provided \$275,000 in gaming revenue to the Polk County Housing Trust Fund for the Home Restoration Program to aid flood victims within Polk County. Several Polk County Departments and staff provided valuable assistance to our citizens as they attempted to recover from the devastating effects this flooding had on their property.

During FY 08/09, the Board also provided grants to many deserving organizations within Polk County through our Community Betterment and Community Development Grant Programs. This funding is available through monies Polk County receives from Prairie Meadows gaming revenues. The Betterment Grant Programs are designed to provide financial support to non-profit organizations that provide cultural, recreational, educational and human needs services to our citizens. This year's awards included a \$500,000 grant to Des Moines Area Community College for the new health science facility.

The Iowa Events Center continues on its track of success providing quality entertainment to our com-This past fiscal munity. year the Iowa Events Center hosted 573 events and brought a profit of \$77,114 to Polk County. Wells Fargo Arena also experienced greater attendance than budgeted. Concerts included Keith Urban/Taylor Swift, Coldplay, Metallica, Rascal Flats, Slipknot, Toby Keith and many more. Other successful events included the Gymnastics Superstars event featuring Shawn Johnson and Walking with Dinosaurs.

The Board, facing \$15 - \$20 million in renovation costs at the Polk County Convention Complex, engaged Economic Research Associates to study the need for additional meeting and ballroom space at the Iowa Events Center. The physical separation and age of the Polk County Convention Complex from the rest of the Iowa Events Center has been found to be a hindrance

in attracting conventions. An expansion of meeting and ballroom space at the Iowa Events Center will reduce operating costs by \$500,000 annually, provide an opportunity to grow business and bring new regional conventions. After receiving a conceptual design of an expansion of meeting and ballroom space at Veterans Memorial Auditorium, the Board moved forward in May of 2009 in issuing a request for proposal for architectural services for a full house expansion of meeting and ballroom space at the Iowa Events Center. The Polk County Convention Complex will continue to operate until the new meeting and ballroom space is complete in 2011.

In June, 2009, Polk County received a written proposal from DM Hockey LLC, owners of the AHL lowa Chops. This offer proposed that the Board accept \$700,000 in settlement of a non-relocation agreement between Polk County and DM Hockey. The Board deemed the proposed settlement unacceptable. The Board of


Supervisors entered into a non-relocation agreement with DM Hockey Holdings, LLC in good faith. Polk County has honored this agreement and expects DM Hockey to honor its part of the agreement by either playing hockey in Des Moines or paying the County the full agreed upon amount to relocate. The Board believes along with the AHL and Global Spectrum (private management firm that operates the lowa Events Center) that AHL hockey can be successful in Des Moines. We have received much public input expressing support for the continuation of AHL Hockey at Wells Fargo Arena. Polk County has been in contact with the AHL regarding this situation, will continue to work with the league to ensure AHL hockey stays in Des Moines and move forward in a manner that is in the best interest of the citizens of Polk County.

The Board continued in its support of affordable and safe housing ensuring transitional housing is provided within the community by expressing its intent to convey the former

Polk County Interim Jail located at 2 SW 9th Street to the Greater Des Moines YMCA for the continuation of the men's transitional housing program.

An agreement with all libraries in Polk County was also approved in FY 08/09 ensuring quality library services for unincorporated residents.

Following the failure of the April, 2008 courthouse annex referendum, the Board committed to reviewing possible alternatives in providing relief for the courts. In May 2009, the Board engaged the services of the National Center for State Courts to review Polk County's court function and space issues. In hiring the National Center for State Courts, it was the Board's intent to look for alternative ways that Polk County could provide space for the courts as well as review areas that would lower costs while still delivering service. We look forward to receiving the

Board of Supervisors



Robert Brownell was elected in 2000 and is serving his third term. He represents the 1st District which is made up of Clive, West Des Moines, and southwestern Des Moines. Brownell's experience in government began as a city councilmember in Clive, elected in 1985. He was elected as mayor in 1993 where he served until his election

to the Polk County Board of Supervisors in 2000.

Brownell was raised in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He attended Missouri Military Academy in Mexico, Missouri, and graduated from Kennedy High School in Cedar Rapids. He obtained his undergraduate degree from the University of Northern Iowa cum laude in English and Education. He has attended Drake University for post graduate work. Brownell served as Branch Manager for Yellow Transportation in Des Moines for 15 years. Prior to Yellow he held several management positions with Roadway Express across the Midwest.



E.J. Giovannetti was elected in 2002 and is serving his third term. He represents Polk County's 2nd District which consists primarily of Ankeny, Grimes, Johnston, Sheldahl, and Urbandale.

Giovannetti's experience in government began on the Planning and Zoning

Commission in Urbandale in 1973. He was appointed mayor in 1977 and served in that position through 1997. Giovannetti has been in the private practice of law with Hopkins & Huebner, P.C. since 1970. Prior to that time, he served as Assistant Attorney General, Counsel for Legislative Research Bureau, and Deputy Industrial Commissioner, all with the State of Iowa.

Giovannetti currently serves as Chair for the Polk County Housing Trust Fund. He also serves on the board for Choose Des Moines Communities, Des Moines Arts Festival, Downtown Events Group, Mid-Iowa Development Fund, Central Iowa Drinking Water Commission, and Endow Urbandale. Giovannetti is also a liaison to the Polk County Board of Health and an alternate to the Des Moines Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). Most recently Giovannetti was elected as Chair to the Mid-Iowa Association of Local Governments (MIALG).



Tom Hockensmith began serving his second term as Polk County Supervisor in January 2003. He represents Polk County's 3rd District, which includes the cities of Alleman, Altoona, Bondurant, Elkhart, Mitchellville, Pleasant Hill, Polk City, Runnells, and the northeast section of Des Moines. He served as the Chair of the

Board of Supervisors in 2005 and 2007.

Hockensmith's previous professional experience includes positions as a policy advisor for Iowa Governor Thomas J. Vilsack, a union representative for American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) and as an electrician for the Iowa Department of Transportation.



John F. Mauro began serving his fourth term as a member of the Board of Supervisors for Polk County's 4th District. John previously served the citizens of Polk County for two consecutive terms after being elected in 1990. John served as Chair of the Board of Supervisors in 1993, 1996, 2004, and 2008.

John is a native of Des Moines and was born and raised on Des Moines' southside. He has been a self-employed businessman and has owned his own insurance agency for many years. John and his wife Grace have been married 45 years. They have three sons and seven grandchildren.



Angela Connolly was first elected to represent Polk County's 5th District in 1998. Connolly is serving as Chair of the Board of Supervisors for 2009. She previously served as Chair in 2000, 2003, and 2006.

Before joining the Board of Supervisors, Connolly spent 19 years working at the Polk County Planning & Zoning department.

She has been active in many civic and community activities including the Metropolitan Planning Organization, Metropolitan Advisory Council, Convention and Visitors Bureau, Health Services Board of Directors, Des Moines Neighborhood Resource Office, Greater Des Moines Sports Authority, Greater Des Moines Partnership, NAMIWalks Advisory Council, Riverfront Development Authority Board of Directors, Polk County Housing Trust Fund, Des Moines Area Regional Transit Authority, and Metropolitan Planning Organization Transit Roundtable.

John Sarcone graduated cum laude from Rockhurst College in 1972 with an A.B. degree in History and was a member of Alpha Sigma Nu, the Jesuit honor society. In 1975, he graduated from Drake University Law School and was admitted to the lowa Bar in June 1975.

Sarcone assumed the responsibilities of County Attorney in January 1991 and was re-elected in 1994, 1998, 2002 and 2006. He was President of the Iowa County Attorneys Association in 1998, and is currently a member of the Board of the Iowa County Attorneys Association. Sarcone was the Iowa State Director of the National District Attorneys Association from 1998 to 2000, and is currently a Vice President of the NDAA Board of Directors, serves on the Executive Committee of NDAA, and is the co-chair of the NDAA Legislative Committee.



Jamie Fitzgerald was unanimously appointed Polk County Auditor and Commissioner of Elections by the Board of Supervisors on January 2, 2007, to fill the unexpired term of the office.

Prior to his appointment, Jamie was First Deputy Auditor for four and a half years under Auditor Michael Mauro. During this time, Jamie directed

many technological upgrades in the office, including recording Board of Supervisors' meetings for the website, overseeing the creation of a biweekly newsletter, and automating the transfer index. As Auditor, Jamie has implemented efficiency and conservation measures which have cut printing in the administrative department more than 25 percent. This was accomplished by putting all Board agendas, minutes and summaries online and by scanning tens of thousands of historical documents, saving addition storage and staff resources. He has also championed a transparent open government office by inviting candidates, the media and public to his office for election demonstrations, tours and explanations of the voting process.

Prior to his Auditor office service, he worked for the Iowa Senate Democratic Research Staff in various capacities, including as a research analyst. His duties included staffing a variety of standing and budget committees, responding to constituent requests, and analyzing and advising Senators on amendments and bills.

Jamie received his Bachelor of Arts from Iowa State University in 1994 and an Associate of Arts degree from Iowa Central Community College in 1992.



Julie Haggerty was sworn into office in January 2007. She is a life-long resident of Polk County, a graduate of Dowling Catholic High School, attended Arizona State University, and is a recent graduate of the Greater Des Moines Leadership Institute.

Haggerty began her career in the Polk County Recorder's office in 1974, where she worked for twelve years, and the last three as First Deputy Recorder. For the next twenty years, Julie was the business manager for her family's business, a local printing company that operated on the city's southside over 45 years.

Since taking office, Haggerty has extended her office hours and established a same-day recording policy. She has also brought services to the citizens of Polk County by launching Passport Saturdays in libraries and senior centers. As an elected official she has been given the opportunity to serve the residents of Polk County in many ways. She has been able to share her knowledge of county government with students in schools and meet with members of the Citizen's Academy and other civic groups. She is presently serving on the Miracle League steering committee, helping build a baseball field near Principal Park for kids with disabilities.



Mary Maloney has served as Polk County Treasurer since 1989, recently re-elected to her fifth term.

Maloney is a 1977 graduate of Iowa State University with a degree in Economics. She brought a financial and computer background in business to Polk County.

Significant technological changes have been made to the office in the last eighteen years; the Treasurer received an "Innovations in Government Award" in 1997 for many of these improvements. Maloney kicked-off an eGovernment initiative in 2002, during her presidency of ISCTA, which received two national awards.



Bill McCarthy was elected Sheriff in November 2008. Prior to becoming Sheriff, McCarthy served for two years as Chief Deputy. Sheriff McCarthy's law enforcement career began 39 years ago as a Police Officer with the Des Moines Police Department. He held positions as an Investigator, Sergeant, Lieutenant, Captain, Assistant

Chief and served as the Des Moines Police Chief until his retirement in February 2006.

He has earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice and a Master of Public Administration Degree from Drake University. He is a graduate of the Police Executive Research Forum's and Harvard's Senior Management Institutes for Police and the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Program and is a certified Polygraph Examiner.

Sheriff McCarthy served five years as President of South Des Moines Little League. He has also administered the Police Athletic League, providing over a number of years a variety of youth sporting activities for hundreds of low-income children in the Des Moines inner city and was instrumental in reopening the Westside Boxing Club and establishing the Eastside Boxing Club.

He is a member of the Community Coalition Against Substance Abuse and has served on many community, school, state and federal task forces dealing with adolescent shelters, school dropouts, youth groups and drug violence. He has served on the Attorney General's Task Force on Juvenile Justice and was appointed by the governor to serve on various committees and councils, including the highly quoted Task Force on Disproportionate Representation. He participated in the President's White House Policy Council meetings on youth gangs and violence, helping to shape the President's initiative on federal juvenile legislation.

Sheriff McCarthy continues to be active in many civic and community organizations.

Iowa Events Center Expansion

Since opening the Iowa Events Center (IEC) in 2005, the future of the Polk County Convention Complex (Plex) has been under review by the Board of Supervisors. Due to the age, condition and cost of renovating the Plex, the Polk County Board of Supervisors engaged Economic Research Associates (ERA) to provide an assessment regarding whether or not there was a need for a possible expansion of a meeting and ballroom space at the IEC. To strengthen the convention and hospitality industry in Des Moines, ERA's assessment advised that the expansion must occur to protect our investment, that the Plex is no longer the most competitive venue for conventions in lowa and that the expansion will provide an opportunity for additional regional/national conventions.

Courthouse Space

A referendum to construct additional court space failed in April 2008. The referendum considered an Option 5a courthouse plan to address the current and future space needs of the courts. The Option 5a plan includes the full use and renovation of the historic courthouse and construction of a new court facility on County owned land immediately south of the present courthouse site at a 2009 construction cost not to exceed \$127 million. By state law, Polk County is responsible to provide space for its state courts. Polk County's Courthouse was originally built in 1906 with four courtrooms.

The National Center for State Courts was engaged by the Board of Supervisors in May of 2009 to perform a review of court function and space issues. The result of this study will provide the information that will allow the Board to identify future courts space needs. The final report is expected to be complete by January of 2010.

Budget & Strategic Planning

The financial condition of Polk County government remains strong. Growth in the tax base and continued revenue from Prairie Meadows has allowed the County to continue to reinforce its fiscal condition. This situation has enabled the County to decrease the tax levy rate while still undertaking new projects and serving a key role in area development efforts.

In November 2008, Polk County reaffirmed its AAA bond rating from Standard & Poor's Ratings Service. The rating service cited the County's strong fund balances, conservative budgeting practices, low debt burden, and steady economic growth as the basis for the rating. The AAA bond rating is the highest rating available, and distinguishes Polk County as having an extremely strong capacity to meet its financial commitments.

Despite uncertain economic times, it is estimated the County will continue to maintain healthy fund balances throughout the upcoming fiscal year. Estimated General Fund ending balances are projected at 24 percent of expenditures, a percentage that falls within the County's adopted financial policies. Nonetheless, the County is closely monitoring the financial situation and reviewing the effect of the economy on budget projections. We are committed to responsible fiscal management and will adapt as needed to continue serving the community in a cost-effective manner.

Housing

In response to the devastating floods that occurred in June of 2008, Polk County approved the expenditure of \$275,000 in gaming revenues to the Polk County Housing Trust Fund for the Home Restoration Program to aid flood victims in Polk County. The Home Restoration Program provided immediate needs assistance to flood affected homeowners, expedited the rehabilitation of homes damaged by flood waters, provided financial assistance to cover shortfalls in available FEMA benefits, provided technical assistance in bid and contractor procurement, ensured personal and emotional needs were addressed by appropriate professionals and provided a lead safe environment for homes with children under the age of six. Polk County received a \$3 million Lead Based Paint Hazard Control Grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The three-year grant provided funding to conduct lead repair work in 206 housing units in Polk and Dallas Counties. The program will involve assisting low income families with children under the age of six. Although this project encompasses all of Polk County,

special targeting has been placed on zip code areas with very high socioeconomic and environmental risk factors. This grant is the largest ever received by the Polk County Health Department and allows us to leverage existing resources and commitments to address lead poisoning in our community by repairing more homes. But most importantly, will allow us to significantly reduce the number of children who are lead poisoned. Polk County participated in assisting the community in resolving a need for transitional housing by selling the property located at 2 SW 9th Street, formerly known as the Interim Jail, to the YMCA of Greater Des Moines for the men's transitional housing program. The YMCA will move forward with this project once additional funding has been received.

Library Funding

Polk County entered into a new agreement in April, 2009 with the Polk County Library Association regarding future funding of Polk County libraries. The agreement includes a formula based on circulation that was agreed upon by the libraries and provides a standard for funding this important community resource for the next few years.

Attorney

The County Attorney is responsible for the prosecution of criminal offenses occurring in Polk County. The County Attorney also provides legal counsel to the Board of Supervisors and any of its departments or boards in civil matters.

The County Attorney handles all juvenile matters including delinquencies, child in need of assistance, and termination of parental rights. Child welfare mediations are also handled in this office. The Restorative Justice Center (RJC) provides Polk County citizens and businesses the opportunity to receive justice in non-traditional law enforcement situations.

The County Attorney's Office has a Collections Unit, responsible for collecting outstanding court costs and fines, once they become delinquent. Parallel with the collection of delinquent court debt, the Unit also works closely with the Polk County Sheriff's office in the collection of jail room and board fees.
