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*Section 1: Situation Description*

Flooding continues around the county causing temporary road closures.

The Raccoon River at Fleur is anticipated to crest at 21.9 feet on 6/26 in the afternoon.

The Raccoon River at Hwy 28 or 63rd St it is anticipated to crest at 40.5 on 6/26 in the afternoon. There is no longer a threat of I-35 closing.

The Des Moines river at SE 6th is anticipated to crest 29.5 on 6/26 in the afternoon.

Flooding continues around the county causing temporary road closures.

The Raccoon River at Fleur is anticipated to crest at 24.1 feet on 6/26 in the afternoon.

The Raccoon River at Hwy 28 or 63rd St it is anticipated to crest at 42.5 on 6/26 in the afternoon with the potential of I-35 closing just south of the Grand Ave exit.

The Des Moines river at SE 6th is anticipated to crest 30.7 on 6/26 in the afternoon.

86th st and 63rd St in Clive are now open.

The USACE is reducing outflow from saylorville reservoir to balance flows with the raccoon, this will increase pool elevation to a projected 850 feet on July 1st, which will utilize 17% of it's utilized storage.

Multiple rounds of severe storms have occurred over night producing heavy rain within Polk County. Thunderstorms capable of producing very heavy rainfall are expected persist into the mid morning hours. Rainfall rates associated with the most intense storms will likely exceed 2 to 4 inches per hour and multiple storms may continue to pass over the same area. Several locations have already received significant rainfall and any additional rainfall in a short time frame will lead to a significant flash flood threat. Rainfall amounts may exceed 3 inches with some locations reaching 5 inches.

Walnut Creek will crest at 80/35 at 13.5 ft and at 17.8 ft at 63rd Street.

Fourmile Creek is cresting slightly below flood stage.

The Raccoon River is expected to go into moderate/major flooding in the Des Moines Metro. It will crest this afternoon.

The Des Moines River will have major flooding at the SE 6th location. However the predictions could change depending on Saylorville operation changes with the Army Corps of Engineers.



## Beaver Creek near Grimes




### Impacts:

- 22.4 Water affects the low part of the west approach to the Northwest 70th Avenue bridge.
- 18.5 Northwest 62nd Avenue in Johnston floods.
- 18 Water reaches the bottom of the Northwest 70th Avenue bridge deck.
- 16 Water affects the east approach of the Northwest 70th Avenue bridge.
- 14.5 Northwest 62nd Avenue in Johnston floods.
- 14 Highway R22 floods south of Iowa 141. Highway F31 west of Granger floods.
- 12 The west river bank overflows just south of the Northwest 70th Avenue bridge.




## Walnut Creek at Des Moines 63<sup>rd</sup> St.



### Impacts:

- 25.4 This is the top of the West Des Moines levee.
- 25 This is the top of the floodwall on the east side of 63rd Street.
- 23.9 Water reaches the road surface of 63rd Street. 18.5 Water affects 73rd Street near I-235. Water reaches the underside of the 63rd Street bridge. Businesses just east of the railroad tracks on Grand Ave affected.
- 17.7 Water reaches the base of the railroad bridge upstream of 63rd Street.
- 17.5 The 63rd Street overhead gates are closed.
- 17 The following roads are closed...Grand Avenue...63rd Street...Walnut Hill Drive and 61st Street. The railroad tracks are closed north of Grand Avenue.
- 16.5 The Grand Avenue overhead gates are closed.
- 16 Water covers Grand Avenue in Des Moines. Water affects some nearby residences.
- 15 North Valley Drive is closed.
- 14 Water covers Hoak Road between Center Street and the levee affecting several businesses.
- 13 Walnut Hill Drive is closed. Lowland flooding occurs along the east river bank downstream of 63rd Street. The levee gate is closed east of Winona Street.


## Raccoon River at Des Moines IA 28



### Impacts:

- 46.2 This is the top of the West Des Moines levee.
- 43 This is the top of the Des Moines levee at Iowa 28 and 63rd Street.
- 42 Water covers I-35.
- 41 The levee is closed at Jordan Creek and Iowa 28.
- 40.5 Water affects Grand Avenue near Raccoon River Regional Park.
- 40 Iowa 28 is closed north of the river. Water overtops the berm on the west side of Raccoon River Park...affecting the park and surrounding area.
- 39 Water affects businesses...Commerce Drive and Raccoon River Drive from South 88th Street to Grand Avenue.
- 38 Water affects primary roads in several locations.
- 36 Water affects Blue Heron Lake at Raccoon River Park.
- 35.5 Water covers Walnut Woods Drive and affects Walnut Woods State Park.
- 30 The City of West Des Moines operates the levee system including pumps.

## Des Moines River at Des Moines SE 6<sup>th</sup> St.



### Impacts:

- 37.3 This is the top of the levee on the downstream side of Southeast 6th Street.
- 35 Water completely fills the grass bowl of the Simon Estes Amphitheater.
- 34 Water surrounds Principal Park and approaches its entrances.
- 30 The following roads are closed...Carlisle Road...Hartford Avenue...Southeast 22nd Street...Edison Avenue and Granger Avenue. Levee gates are closed north of Walnut Street.
- 28.7 Simon Estes Amphitheater is inundated up to intersection of the arcing sidewalks.
- 26.3 Water covers Arthur Street east of Carlisle.
- 26 The levee gate is closed at Southeast 4th Street and Shaw Street.
- 25.7 Water surrounds the base of Simon Estes Amphitheater.
- 24.5 Deans Lake is closed.
- 24 The bike trail is closed east of Water Street.
- 22.7 Levee closures occur at Southeast 15th Street.
- 20.5 The storm valve is closed at Southeast 6th Street and Dunham.
- 20 The east side business storm valve is closed. Water affects the detention basin at East 7th Street and Elm.
- 18.5 The interior drainage gates are closed. Storm sewer backup may occur near Southeast 14th Street and Maury Street.

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## *Section 4: Activation and Staffing Level*

Current activation level is a    of 3 – “Partial” and expected to remain at that level.

The Comprehensive Emergency Plan can be partially or fully implemented in the context of a threat, anticipation of an incident or planned event, or in response to an incident requiring a coordinated response. Implementation of the plan’s coordination mechanisms is flexible and scalable. The following table is a general description of the escalation potential and can be used to quickly index response activities to an activation level.

Activation Level	Description of Activities	
5	<b>Monitoring</b>	Existing resources and capabilities are not necessarily coordinated outside of their own jurisdiction or outside of their immediate discipline. Normal administrative, planning, training, and exercise activities are scheduled and carried out.
4	<b>Limited</b>	Request of limited coordination by available EMA staff personnel for a single jurisdiction or single discipline. This is done from the incident scene, command post, or agency administrative offices. Select procedures and portions of the CEP are utilized as needed.
3	<b>Partial</b>	Activities include the activation of select ESFs primary and support entities are notified to support incident activities and staff the EOC. EOC may be activated but 24-hour staffing is unlikely. CEP Basic plan concepts and select ESFs are implemented.
2	<b>Full</b>	In a full-scale activation, all ESF primary and support entities are notified and the EOC is fully staffed for 24-hour coverage. Activities include the coordination of local resources with the potential of integrating state and federal resources into local response priorities.
1	<b>Advanced</b>	An advanced level means that local capabilities are largely depleted or inadequate to respond to the wide geographic nature or complexity of the incident. Activities include coordinating with state and federal entities and their resources.

The City of Des Moines has started levee monitoring with 4 crews and 12 hour shifts.

Private Businesses requested sand bags, request denied however a list of locations was given so they may call to assist them with purchase. Sand bags are only available for public property and critical infrastructure.

Flood control gate at 63rd and Grand is being closed as of 0730.

Des Moines Water Works is in the process of closing gates and carrying out other activities to protect their areas. The water works drinking production area is not expected to be impacted.

Local Emergency Management Agencies to the south of Polk County have been notified of road closures and suggested routes for EMS to utilize for inbound transports to Des Moines area hospitals.

The Red Cross is assisting with temporary housing due to flooding for 5 people in a duplex at 1275 NW 75th St in Clive.

An apartment building complex at 75th Street and University Blvd was evacuated near North Walnut Creek. Individuals were sent to the public safety building in Clive on 85th and Harbach. They are now back in their homes.

The City of Clive evacuated 10 individuals by boat. (plus 3 dogs evacuated by boat)

1 dependent adult evacuated by ambulance cot and transported to other relatives home in Clive.

The City of Clive requested a boat from the City of Ankeny. It is staged in Clive in case the resource is needed.

Several boat rescues have occurred in Des Moines and West Des Moines. One that occurred in Des Moines was a handicapped person who drove into deep water. Two other people were rescued from a car at Harriet Boat Ramp.
