# A Message from Sheriff McCarthy

Dear Citizens,

The 2010 Annual Report gives me a chance to review with you the past year's challenges and accomplishments, as well as share the goals I have for the Polk County Sheriff's Office.

Like many other law enforcement agencies, in the area and across the nation, we have been impacted by restrictions on funding. As Sheriff, I have made every effort to work with the Board of Supervisors to identify ways to reduce the costs for the services this office provides. A significant part of this was the completion of a staffing analysis for the Jail Division. This analysis identified opportunities to reduce staffing costs, and also improve the operational efficiency at the jail. Additional efforts at the Jail have resulted in reduced costs for food and supplies for inmates.

Inmate health care costs continue to be a significant concern. I have directed my staff to be proactive in identifying efficiencies and controls that can help reduce the expense to the taxpayer. It is important to me that we provide adequate medical and mental health care to inmates in our custody, while doing so in a responsible manner.

Unfortunately, the Jail has become a dumping ground for people with mental health issues and this is not appropriate. Jail staff, while well trained professionals, are not mental health practitioners and have limited options available to them. The agency has forged a partnership with Polk County Health Services, and together we are working to identify inmates with mental health needs in an effort to connect them to available community resources. It is my hope that this will decrease the likelihood of their reoffending.

I continue to be a member of the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council for Polk County, which is a partnership of county, state and municipal agencies. My focus as a member of this organization is to partner with member agencies and community resources to identify and implement strategies to manage the population of the Polk County Jail.

As your Sheriff, I have spoken out publicly in favor of common sense immigration reforms. In 2010, Polk County became the first county in Iowa to partner with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement to implement a fair and equitable process to

identify and remove criminal aliens from Polk County.

Using a new biometric information sharing system, federal agents are able to identify lawful and unlawful aliens which are booked into the Polk County Jail. This prevents criminal aliens from being released back into our community, without causing any additional burden to Sheriff's Office staff.

In 2010 I directed a team of experienced staff to begin a full and complete review of the policies and procedures which governs the Sheriff's Office operations. This is being done to ensure we are in line with current recognized national standards and best practices. One such standard is the Core Jail Certification that is offered through the American Correctional Association. I have appointed Chief Leesa Shoemaker to lead the effort to ensure the Jail practices, policies & procedures are in compliance with Certification Standards, in preparation for a Certification Audit that is expected to be completed in July 2012.

I believe that for an organization to be successful, its staff must be properly trained. I have assigned

Major Donna Brooks to be in charge of the Training Division. Technological advances now offer new opportunities for us to provide better training to our staff and the need for a records management program was identified. Through our focus in this area, we will be able to provide our staff with the knowledge, skills and abilities that are required in today's environment. Our training program will be integrated with specialized field training programs and staff evaluations to provide a more complete picture of the abilities and needs of the Office.

These efforts, and others, are in support of my pledge to provide the Citizens of Polk County with a professional, effective and accountable Sheriff's Office. We will continue to expand our research, planning and analysis capabilities. With the assistance of Polk County Information Technology Services, we have revised the Sheriff's Office website in order to provide easier public access to Sheriff's Office services and information. We will continue to use the website to connect with the public.

The Sheriff's Office is responsible for law enforcement services in the unincorporated areas of Polk County as well as Alleman, Bondurant, Elkhart and Grimes. We are developing new tools to provide information and analysis on crimes and calls for service, within these individual areas. This furthers our efforts to increase public access to information and reports.

The Sheriff's Office is partnering with other local public safety agencies to photograph and map schools and other public buildings. The Sheriff's Office now has School Resource Officers in Bondurant, North Polk and the Saydel Community School Districts. I believe that having this information available to deputies, fire and rescue personnel will be invaluable. Our ability to share this type of information among different agencies is critical. We will continue to seek out new opportunities to share information.

It has been a challenging and rewarding year, and I am confident that 2011 will present

us with new opportunities and tests. I am proud of the men and women who work day and night to provide service to Polk County and I am honored to serve as your Sheriff.





## Staffing Allocations






## Civil



## Office of Professional Standards


Citizens have the right to expect the Sheriff's Office to provide law enforcement services that are fair, effective and impartially applied. The Sheriff seeks to maintain the integrity of the Office, and its employees.

Employees are held to high standards in official conduct, and are expected to respect the rights of all citizens.

Employees have the right to be protected against false charges of misconduct or wrongdoing.

The Office of Professional Standards is responsible for reviewing employee involved critical incidents, and investigating complaints of misconduct. All complaints of misconduct are thoroughly investigated and corrective action is taken as necessary.

# Jail Division



The Polk County Jail is the largest facility of its kind in the state of Iowa and takes advantage of the latest advances in security and jail design to house and manage Polk County's inmates. The jail has a full on-site kitchen and laundry facilities and houses medical services.

The unique jail design provides a direct supervision setting for the inmates. The inmates are housed in large dormitory

areas rather than in traditional barred cells. In addition to the dormitory-style units, the jail has smaller high-security units to house inmates with special needs that can not function in a normal jail environment.


The jail provides programs such as Narcotics Anonymous, Alcoholics Anonymous, and GED classes to inmates. Inmates convicted of State of Iowa criminal charges are billed for their room & board.

## Room & Board Fee Collections




Inmate workers washed over 1 million pounds of laundry in 2010.

## 2010 Releases By Type





## Patrol Areas




# Law Enforcement Services Division

## Criminal Investigation Division

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID), under the command of Major Allan Tunks, investigates crimes committed in Polk County and our contract cities. Crimes investigated by CID include Homicides, Property Crimes, Theft, Burglaries, Arson, Forgery, Criminal Mischief, crimes committed against children, physical and sexual abuse

and missing persons. Detectives obtain evidence, interview victims/witnesses, determine suspects and evaluate cases for prosecution. Their duties also include evaluating crime trends and recovering stolen items. In addition, CID has two trained polygraph examiners and two detectives trained as crime scene investigators.

## Mid Iowa Narcotics Enforcement

The MINE Task Force is a multi-jurisdictional drug task force consisting of officers from twenty-five local, state, and federal agencies and has existed in its present form since 2002. The Task Force is designed to aggressively combat street level drug dealers and to disrupt and dismantle mid-level to upper-level drug trafficking and manufacturing organizations in the task force area.

## Court Staging

Deputies assigned to Court Staging ensure that inmates in the custody of the Polk County Sheriff's Office are transported and present for any and all of their court dates.


Court Staging is located on the first floor of the former "Main Jail" building. Inmates are transported to the building from the Polk County Jail and back once their court appearance is complete.

Deputies at Court Staging also handle the transport of individuals who are arrested at the Courthouse.

## Court Services

The Polk County Sheriff's Office is responsible for ensuring the orderly, peaceful and safe conduct of business at the Polk County Courthouse. Entrance to the Courthouse requires passing a weapons screening, similar to those in place at most airports. Screening stations are located at South Public Entrance, and the West Handicap Entrance.





## 2010 Court Services Statistics


### Confiscated and Abandoned Contraband Items

### Courthouse Arrests




# Law Enforcement Services Division

The Sheriff's Office Training Division is responsible for identifying and providing training classes for all staff. Life saving skills, defensive tactics and firearms training programs are among the core courses.


Specialized trainings are coordinated and hosted for both Sheriff's Office staff, and surrounding agencies.



### **Deputy Sheriff Cass Nemmers**

Deputy Cass Nemmers died September 1, 2010 while participating in training at the Iowa Law Enforcement Academy.



### **Deputy Sheriff Kipton Hayward**

Deputy Hayward was killed October 9, 1993 when he was struck by a drunk driver while diverting traffic around a previous accident.



### **Sheriff Jack Woodard**

Sheriff Woodard was killed in a car accident while on duty on January 21, 1974.



### **Deputy Sheriff Dewey Marshall**

Deputy Marshall was killed October 30, 1926 while assisting a Missouri Sheriff who was serving a warrant. Deputy Marshall was shot and killed by the suspect when he entered his home.
