SECTION 1: SITUATION DESCRIPTION

River Flood Warnings continue for parts of the Des Moines and Raccoon Rivers.

Strong to perhaps severe thunderstorms with heavy rainfall possible later Saturday into early Sunday. This rainfall could prolong current flooding or may cause new river points to go into flood stage

Heat and humidity builds late this week into first part of the weekend with heat index values between 95 and 105.

SECTION 2: FORECAST

Today: Mostly sunny, with a high near 86. Light and variable wind becoming north around 5 mph in the afternoon.

Tonight: Mostly clear, with a low around 68. South southwest wind around 6 mph becoming calm.

Thursday: Mostly sunny, with a high near 88. Southeast wind 5 to 10 mph.

Thursday Night: Partly cloudy, with a low around 74. Southeast wind 9 to 11 mph.

Friday: Sunny and hot, with a high near 97. Breezy, with a south wind 9 to 17 mph, with gusts as high as 28 mph.

Friday Night: Mostly clear, with a low around 75.

Saturday: A 40 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms after 1pm. Mostly sunny, with a high near 91.

Saturday Night: Showers and thunderstorms likely, mainly before 1am. Mostly cloudy, with a low around 69. Chance of precipitation is 70%.


Sunday: Mostly sunny, with a high near 84.


Sunday Night: Partly cloudy, with a low around 67.


Monday: Mostly sunny, with a high near 86.


Monday Night: A 30 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms. Partly cloudy, with a low around 69.

2	Full	In a full-scale activation, all ESF primary and support entities are notified and the EOC is fully staffed for 24-hour coverage. Activities include the coordination of local resources with the potential of integrating state and federal resources into local response priorities	
1	Advanced An advanced level means that local capabilities are largely depleted inadequate to respond to the wide geographic nature or complexity of the incident. Activities include coordinating with state and federal entities and the resources

SECTION 7: EMERGENCY SUPPORT FUNCTION (ESF) STATUS

The Polk County Comprehensive Emergency Plan (CEP) is built on 15 core emergency support functions or ESFs. The ESFs provide the structure for coordinating interagency and interjurisdictional support for significant incidents and planned events in Polk County. The ESF structure includes mechanisms used to provide support to local jurisdictions both for unplanned emergency incidents and planned events alike. The following subsections provide a briefing of activities by emergency support function.

ESF #1: Transportation (transportation of goods/supplies and people; route management; routes blocked; school delays and closings, etc.)

Des Moines Airport:

- Minor flash flooding occurred on 25JUN but no long term issues
- Infrastructure intact

Des Moines road closures:

- George Flagg Parkway from SW 26th to Park Avenue
- SW 30th from George Flagg Parkway to Bell Avenue

Polk County road closures:

- SE Vandalia Dr./SE 80 Ave. SW of Runnells due to Red Rock Resevoir elevation
- SE Stewart Dr. south of SE 56th Ave. due to flood waters of Mud Creek near Red Rock
- Temporary closure of roads due to flash flooding, mainly in Franklin, Beaver, Fourmile, and Camp Townships

Countywide:

Saylorville Reservoir

- Current Saylorville Reservoir Pool: 868.82 feet
- Current inflows to Saylorville Reservoir: 33,000cfs
- Current outflows from Saylorville Reservoir: 16,000cfs
- Saylorville Reservoir Forecast (27JUN 0911hrs) Crest of 882.13 feet on 04JUL
- Pneumatic crest gates have been tested previously and will be again on or around 29JUN
- The following elevations are provided for reference:
 - \circ 836 feet Conservation Pool
 - 884 feet Top of the concrete spillway
 - 890 feet Top of pneumatic crest gates (889 crest gates need to be lowered)

City of Bondurant

- Sandbagging operations occurred in the area of Aspen Drive NE and Lincoln Street NE to stop farm field runoff from entering homes
- Pumps deployed to water retention areas

City of Des Moines:

- Widespread street flooding has occurred. All barricades placed for street flooding have been picked up
- Numerous manhole lids blew off and were reset.
- Numerous sewer backups due to surcharging of the sewer collection system. Sewer surcharge has gone down
- All sanitary and storm water pump stations are functioning normally and all storm water basins are being drained as conditions allow

ESF #4: Firefighting (suppression; prevention; and evacuation)

ESF #5: Emergency Management (EOC and CEP coordination; situation unit, liaison with state and federal entities; etc.)
