<u>Title V Update</u> <i>By Cari Spear</i>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• 26 different languages at VNS• I-Smile Results for FFY 2013 (10/01/2012-09/30/2013)<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ 575 Children received dental screenings○ 581 children received fluoride varnish○ 3714 children received a dental referral○ 1490 children received dental care coordination• Iowa Mission of Mercy (October 18-19 at the Iowa State Fair Grounds, Varied Industry Building)<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ Iowa Dental Association has not released the final report with numbers of patients seen but the initial projection are that of 1476 patients received just over \$1,000,000 worth of free dental services.• I-Smile and the Jump Start Back to School Health Fair (Saturday July 27,2013)<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ 560 children received dental screenings.○ Children were all provided with a dental referral and outreach referral for those needing a way to pay for their dental care.○ 88 children were referred to the VNS Outreach team for Medicaid and Voucher fund application.○ Dental office referrals were given to 28% of the children screened.○ 82 children received their Kindergarten or 9th grade Dental Screening Certificate for School.• Des Moines Water Works<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ Currently reviewing the continuation of adding fluoride to the drinking water.○ If you are interested in providing support for water fluoridation please consider reviewing the information on the Des Moines Water Work website http://www.dmww.org.• Maternal Child Health<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ Promote the health of low-income mothers and children○ Ensure access to quality preventive health services○ Reduce infant mortality and the incidence of preventable diseases○ Increase the number of children appropriately immunized against diseases○ Promote the development of community-based systems of care for pregnant women, children and families.• FFY 2013 Child Health Data<ul style="list-style-type: none">○ 85% Of Children participating the EPSDT Program83% of Medicaid enrolled children ages 0-21 who receive at least one

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ preventive health screen ○ 74% of 2 year olds up-to-date immunizations 4-3-1-3-3-1-4 Coverage. This data is taken out of IRIS and is not always correct because some places do not enter immunizations into IRIS. ○ 90.7% of children age 9-35 months received a blood lead test. ● FFY 2013 Maternal Health Data <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ 85% of women receiving prenatal care beginning in first trimester. ○ 90% of women delivering an infant at a healthy birth weight of 5.5lbs and above. This is due to Intervention and care coordination. ○ 16% of women smoking upon admission. ○ 70% of women who start breast feeding <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ They have started to track how long women are breast feeding for. ○ Women volunteer to be in the program. ○ It is free. ○ 423 pregnant women received home visits (most teens, youngest 12, and oldest 42). 18% increase from FFY 2012 ● Every client gets screened for depression. (Pregnant women get screened 2-3 times during their care).
<p><u>Public Health Director Report (written report + comments)</u> By Rick Kozin</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Lead Testing in children <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Given a packet of a summary of some data we collect of testing for lead poisoning. ○ The total test is more than the number of children tested because some children are re-tested. The total elevated is the number of test results greater than 10 micrograms per deciliter. ○ In 2008, there were a total of 13,745 tests with 242 test elevated. In 2012, 120 of the 11,013 test were elevated. 2006-2012 the total number of kids getting tested went up because of the new law that every child gets tested. Not surprisingly the rate of elevated results has come down but so has the actual number of elevated results. ● Health Department Outcomes <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ We have developed proposed outcomes for all programs and strategies ○ We have developed 3 measures for each strategy: How much did we do? How well did we do it? Is anyone better off? ○ We have started to collect data for FY 2012-2013. ○ We need to review whether we have identified the best measures and whether we have good data sources for the measures.
<p><u>Board of Health/Board of Supervisors Action Review</u> By Scott Slater</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● FY 14 Immunization Services contract from Iowa Department of Public Health. Second year of a 5 year cycle. And also second year with a small increase in funding (8%). All funds partially offset nursing and support staff costs to administer Vaccine for Children program. Unsure at this time what effect Affordable Care Act will have on this in the future. ● Amendment to TB MOU adding additional funding for DOT and medical evaluation. ● Three year contract with Dr Alarcon to continue as medical director (\$51,500/year). Has served in this capacity since 2009. Services

	provided: direct medical serves, consultation, chart review and daytime and evening/weekend on call.
<u>2013 Suicide Survivor Conference</u> By Chris Frantsvog	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Held at Des Moines University on November 23rd, 2013. • Down 5 people from 2012 • 70-90 suicides in Polk County each year • 116 registered online • 8 were walk ins • 80 total attendees • Tried to target communities that do not have a conference in their city or around them. • Participants were from: Prairie City, Pella, Marshalltown, Eldora, Indianola, St. Charles, Huxley, Russell, Oskaloosa, LeGrand, Lorimor, Iowa Falls, Mitchellville, Ogden, Perry, Ames, Anita, Boone, Lamoni, New Virginia and Tama. <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Who they lost <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ Child- 30 ▪ Parent- 14 ▪ Spouse/partner- 16 ▪ Sibling- 17 ▪ Boyfriend/Girlfriend/Fiancé- 3 ▪ Friend/Colleague- 25 ▪ Conference staff, exhibitor, general interest, cousin, other relatives, support, client, self-attempt and attempt by a family member. • What are some ways we can make people aware of the conference?
<u>Communicable Disease</u> By Kari Lebeda Townsend	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Cryptosporidium- Have already seen 6 cases so far this month. • TB cases have been a consistent numbers all year 8 to 11 cases per month. • Sexually Transmitted Diseases cases were at total low for the entire year at 214. This is because we saw fewer patients in November.
