CRITICAL STAKEHOLDERS

While there are many additional partners, key organizations engaged, and authorities involved, the following are <u>critical to the successful execution of this plan</u>:

- Emergency shelters for people experiencing homelessness
- Extreme temperature centers
- Public transportation
- Animal shelters

RESPONSIBILITIES OF LOCAL JURISDICTIONS AND AUTHORITIES

The following expectations apply not only to the <u>critical stakeholders</u> identified above, but also to <u>political subdivisions</u> within the Polk County Emergency Management Commission's membership, their <u>departments</u> and <u>personnel</u>. This may include certain <u>non-profit organizations</u> and some <u>private sector entities</u> that are identified in the plan or involved through agreements and understandings.

Expectations:

- Participate and engage in the processes which create, review and amendment the plan
- Understand and agree to concepts, objectives, strategies, and activities that constitute the plan
- Train personnel and exercise processes in order to execute the plan successfully
- Maintain current information related to personnel, equipment, supplies, and facilities required to implement the plan

CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS (CON-OPS)

This plan provides a framework to coordinate efforts related to Extreme Temperatures in Polk County. It effectively orchestrates the planning, organizing, and decision-making efforts of multiple agencies in a common response to a period of extremely high or low temperatures.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

People without access to reliable air conditioned environments are provided temporary access to safe and comfortable facilities during periods of extremely high or extremely low temperatures. Heated or air conditioned facilities are accessible to the public for those experiencing homelessness and those without adequate heating/cooling resources. These facilities include emergency homeless shelters, senior centers, libraries, shopping malls and other public buildings during their normal hours of business. Services may be limited to what is normally available in that building. Should longer-term sheltering be required, consideration will be given to other sheltering strategies.

ASSUMPTIONS AND PLANNING FACTORS

- Local jurisdictions within Polk County are responsible for the identification of a site suitable for use as an Extreme Temperature Center. Suitability and accessibility guidelines can be found HERE.
- Locations selected by the jurisdiction to serve as an Extreme Temperature Center will be offered a <u>Memorandum of Understanding</u> between the facility owner and the Polk County Emergency Management Commission
- Each site is responsible for providing adequate hours of operation and staffing for the duration of the Extreme Temperature Center's activation and will notify Polk County Emergency Management if the facility is unavailable or has adjusted hours of operation
- Bi-annual meetings (spring/fall) of stakeholders will be conducted to familiarize personnel with the plan prior to extreme temperature seasons

OBJECTIVES

1	Monitor forecast from the National Weather Service for conditions meeting or exceeding criteria
2	Notify active stakeholders of plan activation and demobilization is expected
3	Mobilize the necessary facilities, equipment, supplies and personnel to execute the plan
4	Serve those in need with shelter, respite, transportation and care
5	Demobilize in an organized manner, resupply, collect and summarize activities conducted
6	Review activities for continuous quality improvement
7	Amend the plan as necessary based on improvement actions required

OBJECTIVE 1: MONITOR

Polk County Emergency Management Agency will monitor the forecast from the National Weather Service for conditions that indicate the following conditions.

Monitoring Source: DTN Weather Sentry

Confirming Source: National Weather Service Two Day Hourly Forecast

- A. Heat plan implemented for any period where following conditions are met or exceeded at any time during the day/night:
 - i. 95 degree (heat index) or above and
 - ii. 2 consecutive days in which the heat index does not fall below 75 degrees at night.
- B. Cold plan implemented for any period where following conditions are met or exceeded at any time during the day/night:
 - i. 10 degrees (wind chill) for three or more consecutive days
 - ii. 5 degrees (wind chill) for two or more consecutive days
 - iii. 0 degrees (wind chill) for one or more days

OBJECTIVE 2: NOTIFY

Upon indication of a forecast exceeding the criteria above, the Polk County Emergency Management Agency will directly notify the following entities that the Extreme Temperature Plan will be activated. The activation notification will provide an activation start date/time and expected deactivation date/time. If necessary, the Polk County Emergency Management Agency may host a conference call or virtual meeting to facilitate additional discussion as needed.

OBJECTIVE 3: MOBILIZE

Upon Notification, the following activities should be initiated

- A. Center and Shelter owners/operators should perform a walkthrough of the facility to ensure its readiness and identify any additional needs prior to opening
- B. Signage should be placed inside and outside the Center to identify its location
- C. Traditional and social media may be used by participating jurisdictions and partner organizations to announce their readiness to activate and provide extreme temperature services
- D. Provide operational briefings any necessary "just-in-time training" to support personnel
- E. Prepare to receive people seeking respite from the extreme temperatures

OBJECTIVE 4: SERVE

- A. Emergency Homeless Shelters
 - i. Operate under weather amnesty
 - ii. Outreach services
- B. Warming and Cooling Centers
 - i. Required: Chairs, restrooms, water/drinking fountain and a place to power medical devices
 - ii. Optional: Drinks, snacks, access to vending machines, TV, computers
- C. Des Moines Area Region Transit (DART)
 - i. Free rides to/from emergency homeless shelters and warming/cooling centers
- D. Animal Rescue League
 - i. If necessary, temporarily house pets
 - ii. ARL has the ability you pick up pets from owners at Extreme Temperature Centers if road conditions permit safe travels
 - iii. Sheltering of pets during evacuations and other emergencies is covered in ESF#11: Agriculture, Pets, and Natural Resources
 - iv. Service animals that are individually trained to do work or perform a task to mitigate the effects of a disability are allowed in public spaces by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)

OBJECTIVE 5: DEMOBILIZE

- A. When conditions no longer warrant the continuation of the plan's activities, Polk County Emergency Management will notify stakeholder partners that the activation of the Extreme Temperature Plan has or will expire soon.

- 1. A "Root-Wide Alert" banner and link to the Extreme Temp Resources page will be removed from all of the EMA webpages
- B. When the date/time of mobilization expires as discussed in the notification process, or when conditions no longer meet the mobilization requirements for the Extreme Temperature Center, organizations may begin the demobilization process and return to normal operations.
- C. Provide any available numbers, data, summary of services provided to Polk County Emergency Management Duty Officer at emergency.management@polkcountyiowa.gov
- D. Recommendations to help improve the plan should be documented and passed along to Polk County Emergency Management. Duty Officer at emergency.management@polkcountyiowa.gov

OBJECTIVE 6: REVIEW

Bi-annual planning review workshops will be hosted by Polk County Emergency Management Agency in the spring and fall seasons. These workshop activities will include:

- A. Stakeholders will review the Extreme Temperature Plan as well as the previous season's experience
- B. Polk County Emergency Management will facilitate an orientation to partners for the next seasonal application.
- C. Recommended edits will be discussed and a proposal made to the Polk County Emergency Management Commission for plan amendments.

OBJECTIVE 7: AMEND

- A. The Extreme Temperature Plan is one section of the Emergency Support Function (ESF) Annex #6: Mass Care and Sheltering
- B. ESF#6: Mass Care and Sheltering is a function annex to the Polk County Comprehensive Emergency Plan (CEP)
- C. The Code of Iowa Chapter 29C requires each Local Emergency Management Commission to adopt a Comprehensive Emergency Plan.
- D. Initial adoption and any subsequent amendments to the Countywide Comprehensive Emergency Plan shall be under the authority of the Polk County Emergency Management Commission.
- E. Proposed amendments to the Extreme Temperature Plan may be recommended by stakeholders and presented to the Commission by the Polk County Emergency Management Director or their designee.

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION

Suitability and Accessibility Guidelines

Facility Criteria

- At a minimum, Extreme Temperature Centers provide heat and/or air conditioning and reliable electricity (generator availability preferred). If a generator is not located on site, a hitching post where a generator can be hooked up is highly desirable.
- If possible, the location of the Extreme Temperature Center should be along posted snow routes so that public works crews can maintain ready access to the facility during winter months.
- Restroom facilities should be available. Shower facilities are not required, but could be an advantage.
- When selecting a facility, the maximum occupancy of the structure or room should be taken into consideration and fire codes shall be followed.

Accessibility

- Extreme Temperature Centers will be accessible to those with Functional Needs. Functional Needs are defined as services that enable individuals to maintain their independence in a general population shelter. Children and adults requiring Functional Needs Support Services may have physical, sensory, mental health, and cognitive and/or intellectual disabilities affecting their ability to function independently without assistance. Others that may benefit include women in late stages of pregnancy, elders, and people needing bariatric equipment.
- Law enforcement should be contacted for cases where guests are inebriated, actively psychotic, generally disruptive or a combination of these conditions.
- Consideration should be given to the need for specialized care, such as transport of individuals to alternate care sites, or to hospital emergency rooms.
